This report is generated for the City of Los Angeles grantee for federal award number 2009-DG-BX-0118. The award amount is \$ 899,959. It reflects performance measurement data for the period January 1 - June 30, 2015. Any funds reported only represent an estimate of dollars allocated or used for activities covered by this award.

Project Description

This program is funded under both the Edward Byrne Memorial Competitive Grant Program (Byrne Competitive Program) and the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program. Authorized by the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2009 (Pub. L. 111-8), the Byrne Competitive Program helps local communities improve the capacity of state and local justice systems and provides for national support efforts including training and technical assistance programs strategically targeted to address local needs. The JAG Program (42 U.S.C. 3751(a)) is the primary provider of federal criminal justice funding to state and local jurisdictions, and JAG funds support all components of the criminal justice system. The Smart Policing Initiative seeks to build upon the concepts of 'offender-based' and 'place-based' policing and broaden the knowledge of effective policing strategies. The most convincing research demonstrates that 'place-based' or 'hotspot' policing reduces violent crime and neighborhood disorder. This initiative address the need for effective policing that requires a tightly focused, collaborative approach that is measurable, based on sound, detailed analysis and includes policies and procedures for accountability. The Los Angeles Police Department's Real-time Analysis and Critical Response Division (RACR) will employ the principles of problem-oriented policing by scanning, analyzing, responding, and assessing the problem of gun violence in selected neighborhoods in Los Angeles. They will implement a RACR strategy to reduce crimes by improving the use of analytic tools to address crime. The goal is to improve neighborhood safety by using problem solving methods and new and innovative technology to increase efficiency of police officers and investigators. CA/NCF

Operation LASER was extended to include six divisions: 77th Street, Newton, Southeast, Southwest, RACR (real-time crime center) and Air Support Division. The goals and objectives for each division were clarified; measures of dosage and crime were finalized; new hot spot corridors were established; and new chronic offender bulletins were created. Weekly monitoring of activity is now in place and a Commander oversees the activities of the Divisions.

Jan - Mar 15	Within each division, Captains are using a variety of tactics to combat gun-related and violent crimes. For each of the hot spot corridors in each division, they are using bike, foot, and regular patrol as well as special units (gang, Parole Compliance Unit, and Special Enforcement). The hot spot corridors are designated as LASER Zones 1-6 and police activity and crime are tracked routinely.

Jan - Mar 15	Revisions were made to the tactical plans after one month of activity. These were based on dosage and on the ability of officers to use their discretionary time within the hot spot corridors. We found that plans needed to be revised because the hot spot corridors were too large or not large enough. In each division, changes were made.

Jan - Mar 15	The research partner met individually with two Assistant Chiefs, the Chief of Staff, and commanders in the LAPD. He reported on the implementation efforts of the four divisions, the changes in the strategies and tactics, and provided computer-generated maps of the hot spot corridors. Also, weekly reports are begin produced by the analyst in the Office of the Central Bureau. These reports include the amount of dosage (time spent in the corridors by officers), the number of crimes that occur in the hot spot corridors during the current and prior weeks, and the number of chronic offender bulletins that are produced.	
Apr - Jun 15	The research partner provided information about Operation LASER to police leadership regarding dosage and violent crime. Dosage is the amount of time (in minutes and hours) that officers spend in the hot spot corridors. The research partner provided graphs and charts depicting the amount of time and the number of crimes in the areas. The results were inconclusive as not enough time has passed to show any real changes.

Narrative

Grantee-level narrative for the period January 1, 2015 - June 30, 2015 were reported as follows:

BJA 7 Questions
Question: What were your accomplishments during reporting period? Response: During this six-month reporting period, the Chief of Police made Smart Policing a major priority for the Department. He said that Smart Policing would be the primary method for reducing violent crime in Los Angeles for 2015. He also said that the four areas with the highest numbers of violent crime in 2014 would be implementing/continuing Operation LASER -- 77th Street, Southeast, Southwest, and Newton Divisions. Air Support, Metro, and the Real-Time Analysis and Critical Response (RACR) Divisions would support the four patrol divisions.
Question: What goals were accomplished, as they relate to your grant application? Response: The department has begun to institutionalize Operation LASER. This is evidenced by the following: The Commander at South Bureau oversees all facets of LASER through his office. He has an analyst who assists the four divisions with their analytic needs. Second, an officer at the Information Technology Bureau assists the divisions by providing training and technical assistance in using Palantir, developing brief training materials for use by analysts and officers, and is now creating a policy and procedure for the Chronic Offender Bulletins. Operation LASER is also routinely mentioned at command staff meetings and Captains are questioned about LASER at Compstat.
Question: What problems/barriers did you encounter, if any, within the reporting period that prevented you from reaching your goals or milestones? Response: None
Question: Is there any assistance that BJA can provide to address any problems/barriers identified in question #3? Response: No NR

Question: What major activities are planned for the next 6 months? Response: During the next six months, the four divisions will continue to implement Operation LASER and measure their outcomes. We will continue to collect and analyze data on a weekly basis and provide updates to Command Staff at Compstat. In October, a re-assessment of the hot spot corridors and the list of chronic officers will take place. We will determine whether the strategy has been effective with the specific areas. We will make adjustments if necessary. We will also add four more Divisions to Operation LASER before the end of the year. The selection of the Divisions will be based on violent and gun-related crime, the abilities of the Captains to 'stand up' a Crime Intelligence Detail, and the willingness of the Captains to adhere to the major elements of the program.
